## Come see the Museum's newest exhibit!

### "Continuum of Care: A History of WNY Human Service Agencies"

The exhibit is intended to highlight the unique history of human service agencies throughout the Western New York Region. This exceptional history is more than just dates of establishment or old street addresses, it is like a family saga. It's the story of people who saw a need to help others to lead lives that would be meaningful and appreciated.

Created to be unveiled in a series of installments, the first chapter of the exhibit focuses on several notable agencies including the Sunshine League for Retarded Children, The Niagara County Chapter of the Association for the Help of Retarded Children, The Vocational Farm School for Boys in Appleton, NY, and Le Couteulx St. Mary's Benevolent Society for the Deaf and Dumb, which is now St. Mary's School for the Deaf.

The exhibit features educational panels as well as unique historical artifacts, including items from the museum collection and imagery that are relevant to Western New York human service providers – past and present.

The exhibit is on display now through August 31.

## **Curator Corner**



Two interesting recent additions to the growing Museum of disABILITY History collection include a set of modified action figures and a short series of newsletters.

The "Purple Heart Action Figures" were a donation made to the Museum by a person who thought they needed an appropriate home that would allow the public to view them and reflect upon their significance. These eight G.I. Joe and Barbie dolls were dressed in military fatigues and bore the wounds that had earned them the right to wear The Purple Heart. Each of these figures has a Combat File Sheet which details their rank, motivation to serve in the military, circumstance of their injury, after action report and Purple Heart certificate. These items were donated after the debut of the Museum's most recent feature exhibit "War and disABILITY."

Additionally, five issues of "Madness Network News: A Journal of the Psychiatric Inmates' Liberation Movement" have been added to the research library. This tabloid style newsletter was generated by former recipients of psychiatric services. They contain compelling articles relevant to the disability rights movement and the formation of groups of "Survivors" of mental health treatment that emerged in the 1970s.




    This event featured Ari Ne-Eman, founding president of the Self Advocacy Network.

# **People Ink Press**

The Museum of disABILITY and the People Ink Press have teamed up with New England Photographer John Gray to publish an exclusive special edition of his book, *Abandoned Asylums of New England: A Photographic Journey by John Gray.* 

Abandoned Asylums of New England offers the work of photographer John Gray who has captured the final throes of the once majestic monuments of medical treatment. This photographic journey into the world of urban exploration documents the state of some of New England's storied temples of control, treatment and rehabilitation of individuals with disabling conditions. The Museum of disABILITY History provides a historical context for these asylums that heightens the degree of entropy into which these feats of architectural grandeur have fallen. From the gigantic Kirkbride campuses to the airy tuberculosis hospitals, Gray's photography reveals through its compositions the poignant echoes of the lives lived, and sometimes lost, at these disappearing asylums.
